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

I'm so pleased to be writing my column with some good news and lots of hopeful updates.

Our January, February and March concerts were sold out, and the shows were fabulous! But, with a max of 32 guests per show, the Blue Bamboo wasn't that difficult to fill. In January we presented the Suzi Park Quartet, February it was the Terry Myers Quartet, and in March it was vocalist Christopher Keough who brought along his vocal group Resolve as an added treat. Our April and May Concerts will be equally outstanding. In April we're presenting trumpeter and vocalist Bobby Pickwood. Bobby has played with jazz greats around the world. Locally, he's been with Bill Allred's Classic Jazz Band and leads the Grand Floridian Society Orchestra, to mention a few. Kramer, Kramer & Parnell will once again do their yearly fundraiser for us in May. All the proceeds from that concert go directly to the Scholarship Fund. Michael and Ben Kramer and Greg Parnell donate their time which is also a financial boon for us. Blue Bamboo is raising the attendance to around 45 for the April Concert and perhaps even higher for May as more and more people get vaccinated.

We're putting together our 2021-2022 concert season which runs from September thru May. It's difficult because we are unsure of the seating capacity at Blue Bamboo and the CDC recommendations at that time. We're keeping our fingers crossed that the seating numbers will increase dramatically, and we'll definitely keep you posted as to dates and times and numbers. In most cases, as always, our concerts will be on the second Sunday of each month at 3:00.

As you know, one of our main focuses is on our scholarship program. Last year, because of COVID, we held the competition via ZOOM. It was great and the "kids" worked really hard to present themselves on camera from their homes. We had wonderful candidates and performances, but it was just not the same as in person with professional accompaniment. I'm so happy to report that our competition this year will be held in May in person at Blue Bamboo. We haven's locked down the exact date and we're not sure if we'll be able to allow guests to attend. I'll keep you posted on that, as well.

And now some sad news. Our membership has fallen to an all-time low at less than 50% of the pre-COVID level. I can understand some of your thinking. Why renew a membership that has nothing to offer. No concerts (April thru November), and such limited seating! Well, we're still here and trying to maintain and regroup moving forward to offer you a wonderful new season and continue to support our young jazz musicians through scholarships, but it's difficult without your support. I want to thank those of you who have renewed. We're grateful! And we're hopeful that the rest of you who have let your memberships lapse will consider renewing and remain part of our wonderful CFJS family.

In closing, I want you to know that we miss you and look forward to seeing you all in our new season. In the meantime, please take care, stay safe and God bless you all!



Unlike Figueiredo's excellent 2020 album, Compilation (Arbors)—for which he played electric guitar on about half the tracks—his new release is an all-acoustic, all-original affair featuring four solo guitar cuts and eight tunes on which he's joined by the simpatico Brazilian crew of Alexandre Piu (piano), Eduardo Machado (fretless bass) and Fernando Rast (drums).

A native of Franca, Brazil, Figueiredo has crafted a program with song titles that allude to specific, appealing places—such as "Seville," "Bryant Park," "Edgewater Park" and "From Rio To Paris"—but no locale is more distant than the one cited in the title track, "Antarctica." This suite-like solo guitar piece features intriguing, graceful transitions between the sections, resulting in a work that evokes the awesome majesty of the southernmost continent. Figueiredo composed the song while traveling via cruise ship. As he wrote in an email to DownBeat, "I could explore the sea and land around Antarctica, and it was one of my best experiences of my life. The penguins, the silence, the beautiful sky and the icebergs—it was all a unique and new experience for me."

In contrast to the title track, the quartet tunes "Samba for Haroldo" and "Caribbean Gonzaga" offer a tropical vibe that conjures images of rolling waves and seaside strolls. Figueiredo composed another one of the album's quartet tracks, "My Friend Menescal," as a tribute to the bossa pioneer Roberto Menescal (who composed the standard "O Barquinho" and who wrote the liner notes to last year's *Compilation*).

Some of the music here would be an appropriate soundtrack for deep thinking and even meditation, but the melodies are consistently compelling. The program concludes with the uplifting "Alma," an anthem punctuated with Piu's buoyant

piano lines and the leader's intricate, cyclical solo. The song conveys a mood of "Seize the day," prompting this listener to spin it over and over.

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The 25 Best Female Jazz Singers of All Time

There is no shortage of talented vocalists, but the best female jazz singers possess unique voices which hold their own against their male counterparts.

Ever since jazz was born at the dawn of the 20th Century, women have been — and continue to be — a minority in what is a largely male-dominated world. There is, however, one area of the genre where females have always excelled and flourished — the domain of the jazz vocalist. There has been no shortage of talented singers over the decades, but the best female jazz singers possess unique voices and personalities which truly ensure they hold their own against their male counterparts.

Jazz has produced so many accomplished and influential female singers over the years that limiting the best female jazz singers to a meagre 25 is a challenge that many would deem impossible. It's not so much a question of who to include, but, rather, who to omit. There are, of course, those who are so significant that their names will automatically be at the top of most people's lists of the best female jazz singers of all time —

namely, the mighty Holy Trinity comprising Ella Fitzgerald, Billie Holiday, and Sarah "Sassy" Vaughan.

While this formidable trio's greatness is not in dispute – nor ever will be – it doesn't necessarily mean that the remaining 22 singers on the list that follows can be considered as mere also-rans, there just to make up the numbers. Indeed, each one has a unique quality that makes them special, and they have all made (and some are still making) a vital contribution to the art – and history – of jazz singing.

There are those, like Ella, Vaughan, Betty Carter, and Anita O'Day, whose voices are agile and athletic, and able to indulge in mind-boggling vocal gymnastics. But dazzling technique isn't everything – nor is it, necessarily, a prerequisite for being a jazz singer, as Billie Holiday, Nina Simone, and Peggy Lee demonstrated. For those artists, communicating with their audience and conveying deep emotion was paramount. The fewer notes they used, the more profound and eloquent they seemed to be.

The inclusion of contemporary chanteuses — among them Dianne Reeves, Madeleine Peyroux and Diana Krall — reveals that Ella Fitzgerald, Billie Holiday and Sarah Vaughan still have descendants in jazz. More importantly, their presence shows us that singing jazz isn't a dead art form but is very much alive and still evolving. And with talented young singers such as Cécile McLorin Salvant, Charenée Wade, Cyrille Aimée and Jazzmeia Horn all waiting in the wings, the future looks incredibly bright for female jazz singers.
