If Jazz were a person, we would say that, among other things, she is an **influencer**.

Jazz music is an incredibly important part of American culture. Throughout the 1920s, jazz seeped into nearly every aspect of American culture. Everything from fashion and poetry to the Civil Rights movement was touched by its influence. The style of clothing changed to make it easier to dance along to jazz tunes. Even poetry evolved as a result of jazz, with **jazz poetry** becoming an emerging genre in the era. These poems featured the same depth of emotion and improvisational feel of jazz music.

#### Jazz poetry has been defined as poetry that

"demonstrates jazz-like rhythm or the feel of improvisation" and also as poetry that takes jazz music, musicians, or the jazz milieu as its subject.

The women's liberation movement was a huge cultural moment, thanks in part to the influence of jazz. As dance halls and jazz clubs spread, a growing number of women had a place to go to act as an outlet for their rebellions against traditional gender roles.

The influence of jazz still resonates more than a hundred years after those first notes called couples out onto the dance floor. With significant influence in every genre of music, jazz particularly impacts rock and roll.

David Bowie once said, "Jazz was a music that seriously paralleled rock music for me when I was young. I really felt at home with modern jazz. I wanted to understand how it worked."

The Beatles was another band that famously credited jazz as their biggest influence and inspiration. Those improvisational moments that were shown to us by jazz are still often reflected in rock-n-roll performances.

Next on the list is hip hop. Many of the themes of hip hop are similar to those of the earliest jazz. Things like activism, oppression, freedom of speech, social justice, love, and heartbreak can all be heard in today's most famous hip-hop songs.

Finally, influenced by both jazz and blues, R&B is a popular genre, famous for its soul and in-depth lyricism. Like jazz, R&B

shares the essence of storytelling through song, using rich lyrics to touch on sensitive topics.

Having begun as a melting pot of culture, jazz stood as the influence and foundation of our favorite songs today.

Some of the most famous rock musicians in the world counted jazz as primary influences in their music.

I read a recent article that stated that global live music revenue is surpassing pre-Covid levels this year.

According to a recent PricewaterhouseCoopers International Limited (PwC) study, the global live music industry is set to exceed its pre-pandemic performance this year.

The Global Entertainment & Media Outlook 2023–2027 report reveals that live music ticket sales are projected to reach \$23.0 billion in 2023, surpassing the \$21.5 billion generated in 2019, the last year before the global outbreak.

After experiencing a significant decline to \$5.4 billion in 2020, a gradual recovery to \$10.2 billion in 2021 and \$20.3 billion in 2022, the live music sector is predicted to continue growing steadily. The combined revenue from live music and cultural events is projected to surpass the \$66.6 billion mark achieved in 2019 by 2024. This highlights the enduring appeal of live experiences.



As on the first recording of this two-volume series, acclaimed tenor saxophonist <u>Don Braden</u> pays tribute to a couple of his coming-of-age idols, singersongwriter <u>Stevie Wonder</u> and the genre-defying group Earth, Wind and Fire. Braden has chosen four of Wonder's compositions and three associated with EW&F to accompany a pair of his splendid original themes.

Braden plays tenor saxophone most of the way, flute and alto flute, respectively on Wonder's "Bird of Beauty" and "Creepin.'" Needless to say, he is superb on every instrument, summoning his many years of experience to enrich each song. For support, Braden has enlisted the services of pianists Art Hirahara (four tracks) and <u>Miki Hayama</u> (six), bassist <u>Kenny Davis</u>, drummer <u>Jeremy Warren</u> and (on three tracks) percussionist Kahlil Kwame Bell, all excellent choices. Bell lends solidity and substance to EW&F's "In the Stone" and "Reasons" and Wonder's "Creepin.'"

The choice of music is admirable, as Braden's originals, "Profusion" and "Arise," more than hold their own against impressive competition, opening with the swing/samba "In the Stone" and closing with another of EW&F's high-spirited themes, "That's the Way of the World." Wonder's medium-grooved "Master Blaster" is given an emphatic ride, as are his tender ballad "Send One Your Love," ardent "Bird of Beauty" and seductive "Creepin.'" Braden's high-stepping "Profusion" (inspired by a pair of Wonder's compositions) and fast-moving "Arise" find the leader at his outspoken best, as does the sleek and melodious "Reasons." While Braden takes the lion's share of solos, there are concise yet engaging statements along the way by Hirahara, Hayama and Davis.

Those who have followed Braden's long and rewarding career will know pretty much what to expect—tasteful music adeptly performed by an outstanding tenor saxophonist and his able supporting cast.



# New Orleans Jazz Brunch

Long before the rest of the country adopted the social event of Sunday brunch, the custom had been firmly established in New Orleans. And when jazz was added to the mix, brunch became a much-loved tradition. Try this classic brunch recipe.

### **The Perfect Ramos Fizz**



#### Ingredients:

- 1/4 cup gin
- 2 tsp. fresh lemon juice
- 1 tsp. fresh lime juice
- 2 tsp. sugar
- 1 egg white (from a pasteurized egg)
- 2 tsp. heavy cream
- Few drops of orange-flower water
- 3/4 cup crushed ice
- About 1/3 cup club soda
- Freshly grated nutmeg, to taste (optional)

#### Directions:

In a blender or cocktail shaker, combine the gin, lemon and lime juices, sugar, egg white, cream, orange-flower water, and crushed ice. Blend or vigorously shake until well mixed and frothy, about 1 minute. Pour into a highball glass, fill to the top with club soda and dust with nutmeg. Serve immediately.

# Tony Bennett, Legendary Jazz and Pop Singer, Dead at 96



August 3, 1926 - July 21, 2023

With his ease of manner and warm baritone vocal tone, Bennett became one of the country's most popular crooners in the years immediately after Frank Sinatra's early success. He took on both the Great American Songbook standards alongside tracks by everyone from Hank Williams to the Beatles. Along the way, he helped bring jazz into the mainstream via collaborations with the likes of Count Basie. His trademark song, "I Left My Heart in San Francisco," was later included in the Grammy Hall of Fame.

Always maintaining a youthful spirit, Bennett reinvented himself and bridged generations later in life. He collaborated in song with Lady Gaga, Diana Krall, Michael Bublé, Carrie Underwood, the late Amy Winehouse, and more. The singer racked up an impressive 20 Grammy awards, two Emmy awards, and was honored with The Library Of Congress Gershwin Prize for Popular Song, making him the first "interpretive singer" to win the honor.

We grew up and grew old listening to Tony Bennett, and his death leaves a void that will be hard to fill.
